A Tribute to my Mum - Marie McFarlane



Mum was born in Kelso in March 1930 an only child for Jonny and Madge Brunton who owned a shoe shop on Bridge Street.

Mum attended Kelso High School where sport and art were probably her chosen subjects. She was undefeated in the 110 yards in 6 years, she also competed in high jump and played hockey for the first team and in her 6^{th} year she was the dux of art.

When Mum left school she continued her sporting prowess playing for the Caledonian Hockey Team a Scottish representative ladies team where she was the only girl from the Borders and

the youngest player when they competed in a tournament in Amsterdam. She also represented the south of Scotland at badminton.

The other passion in Mum's life growing up were animals, she had a horse called Red Herod she often took part in the ride outs or gymkhanas as part of Kelso Civic week and was proud when her cousin Jock Hume was named Kelso Laddie in 1953. Mum was one of the 84 horses that year that did the full day Yetholm Ride where they cross the border into England and check the boundaries.



Once married Mum gave up her job as a Bank Clerk at the Bank of Scotland in Kelso to become a housewife and mother to four children - Shona, Ewan, Callum and myself, Kirstie. Mum and Dad had a ready-made doggy family as one of their wedding presents was a yellow Labrador they got from the racing driver Jim Clarke.

When Mum had all her Children she was at a dinner Party at the home of the late Rainy Brown in the early 1970's where he had some dogs called Cavalier King Charles Spaniels and this is where Mum's passion for the breed started. Rainy recommended visiting the Late Berry Robinson of Buckny affix. Mum and Jim went to visit and to look at a puppy and they bought a Black and Tan bitch called Buckny Toute Seule. While there Jim admired a 16 month old Blenheim bitch, Buckny Concerto and they came back down the road with a ready-made Cavalier family for the total cost of £70!

The showing came shortly afterwards where she attended her first show with instant success of a 5th at Scottish Kennel Club and from then on she was hooked. This was the start of an absorbing hobby that was the beginning of many lasting friendships. Mum didn't force the dogs and showing on the family but was delighted that Shona and then I shared in the hobby.



Mum started breeding and showing under the Cotterlee affix and the picture above is Cotterlee Snowfall who was from the first litter and by Ch. Kershope Sandonpark Icebreaker out of Buckny Concerto. Max did fairly well in the show ring and was Best in Show at the Scottish Cavalier Open Show in the mid 70's. Shona started showing with Mum under the Merryoth Affix which transferred to myself when Shona was tragically killed in a car accident in 1980.




Mum served for many years on the Scottish Cavalier Committee eventually becoming Vice Chairman and Chairman in 1990. In 1999 she was nominated as the President of the Scottish Cavalier King Charles Spaniel Club, a position that was still held till her passing.

Being a Kelso girl she naturally got involved in the Border Union Dog show first being on the Committee in the late 1970's and then in the early 90's she became Vice Chairman of the society taking over as Chairman in 1994 till 2004 and from then until now she remained as a Vice President. In the last few years she hasn't been able to take as active a part as she used to. However her passion and pride for this show shone through if you ever spoke to Mum about it and the reputation it has as the exhibitor friendly show.


Mum first awarded CC's in Cavaliers at Darlington in 1986 and attracted an entry of 351 and went on to award CC's a total of 11 times, including the Scottish Cavalier Ruby Anniversary show in 1999 alongside the great Susan Burgess. The last time she awarded CC's was Dogs at Border Union in 2005. She also judged 3 times for the Cavalier Club of America, Sweden and Ireland.

Mum had multiple Reserve CC winners across the years - including Merryoth Moonstone (who was bred by Shona), Cotterlee Canna Lass, Homerbrent Rhum Lass. She also had great success with Cotterlee Crème De La Crème (Katie) and Capercaillie who were sired by Ch. Homaranne Caption, Katie was Best in Show at Scottish Cavalier Open show three times.

Mum bred one champion - Ch. Devon Lass of Homerbrent at Ricksbury who was made up in 1985 and won 4 CC's and 7 RCC's and was owned by Brian Rix and Kevan Berry. Devon Lass and her mum Rhum Lass were the last daughter and mother combination to win the CC and Res CC at the same show, Southern Counties in 1985 under Brian Mitchell.

Mum stopped breeding Cavaliers in 2007 but has taken great pride in my dogs and judging career. Mum liked nothing more to be in the presence of a Cavalier and they gave her great comfort laterally with her best friend being one of my current dogs Jonesie.

Mum introduced me to a hobby where I have met and made some

lifelong friends and allowed me to travel places I never thought I would.

She was my inspiration, my guiding light and above all my best friend,

dog shows are never going to be the same.
